"Improve Your Hearing Relationship with Music"
Presenter: Dr. Brad Ingrao, AuD

Audiologist & musician, Dr. Brad Ingrao will discuss:

- How speech & music are different
- How to reconnect with music
- Why hearing aids and cochlear implants struggle with music
- How to identify your 'best' music
- A plan to improve your ability to hear & enjoy music

The Walk4Hearing option gives us a chance to support one another, say thanks, and help erase the stigma that suggests we should all hide our hearing loss... all while helping raise funds to further HLAA's vital work on behalf of people with hearing loss.

#### The Sound of Misinformation...

Have you watched the movie "Sound of Metal"? It was nominated for 'Best Picture', and for several other awards at the 2021 Oscars, so has received a lot of publicity and many viewings.



The lead character is a heavy metal drummer who is suddenly deafened due to noise. He delivers a fine performance on the frustration and life changes this hearing loss causes. Those of us with adult onset hearing loss can certainly identify with the fear, frustration and fatigue he encounters.

Unfortunately, the movie gives a lot of false impressions about hearing loss and treatments for it. HLAA, the American Cochlear Implant Alliance, and other organizations that promote and believe in using technology to treat hearing loss are concerned about the false impressions this story gives. It is not a documentary; it's a drama, but people tend to embrace concepts in such stories. In this one, you definitely get the message that cochlear implants (CIs) are a waste of money.

According to a statement from HLAA, it has been a long time since cochlear implants have been given such bad press. We know they are not a miracle cure, but we also know they are a powerful tool that allows many people of all ages to live, learn, work and remain in the hearing mainstream.

The hearing healthcare providers in the film, from the surgeon to the audiologist, give absolutely no support to the character. The timeline is unrealistic. The push for him to learn sign language and become involved in a deaf school is unrealistic.

Around the world there is a massive gap between those who could potentially benefit from CIs and those who have them. In high income countries only 5-10% of people with severe to profound hearing loss have CIs, in spite of the documented benefits to the individual and society being well proven. In low income countries, as expected, the percentage is even lower. A movie like 'Sound of Metal could very possibly deter many from getting a CI or even learning about their possibilities.

HLAA, and other organizations are educating and advocating worldwide for greater awareness and acceptance of CIs.

Misinformation in the form of 'entertainment' is the last thing hard of hearing people need!

The first-ever World Report on Hearing from the World Health Organization (WHO) says that 2.1 billion people live with hearing loss, and the numbers are growing. The report states that nearly 1 trillion International dollars are lost annually from unaddressed hearing loss. At the same time, WHO says the investment in ear and hearing care is cost—effective.

#### **April Chapter Meeting Summary...**

Audiologist Brittany Uitenbroek began by taking us back to the basics of better hearing during her ZOOM presentation on April 12. She outlined the major health factors affecting hearing including cardiac health, diabetes, ototoxicity, safety/balance and cognitive decline

It was interesting to learn about the inner ear's extreme sensitivity to blood flow. As such, stable blood pressure of an individual is a key component of hearing wellness. Dr. Uitenbroek was able to demonstrate how various medical conditions can impact hearing health.

She went on to describe the variety of hearing assistive technologies available today - touching briefly on noise management, AI (artificial intelligence), Bluetooth connectivity for direct streaming, hearing loops and telecoils, smart phone Apps, etc. Suffice it to say there is a ton of technology out there - which is why it is so important to have a trusted and continuing relationship with your audiologist to help you navigate what works best for you. The six major hearing aid companies identified by Dr. Uitenbroek are Signia, Oticon, Resound, Widex, Phonak and Starkey.

There was plenty of time for the 26 people in attendance to ask specific questions at the end of the program.

Thank you Dr. Uitenbroek for your most excellent overview of how assistive technology can help us to have better hearing.
