Katherine Rybak has had hearing loss since birth. She is the founder of *Hearing Out Loud®*, an organization with a mission to move people with hearing loss forward in their lives as strong self-advocates who celebrate their identity, embrace technology, and confidently implement strategies to make meaningful connections within their communities.



Katherine holds a master's degree, and is a board certified teacher of the d/Deaf and hard of hearing in Wisconsin. Her lived experience with hearing loss presented challenges to her in education as well as in her personal and professional life. Those experiences form her work today as an educator, author, designer and advocate who empowers children and adults with hearing loss to develop the confidence and strong skill set necessary to become their own best self-advocates. She is a member of the HLAAWI board of trustees.

May Chapter Program Review...



Thank you to Kristen Felten from the Wisconsin Dept. of Health Services for presenting at our May meeting. Together, we explored the correlation between hearing loss and the potential for cognitive decline.

MS Felton shared information about various types of dementia, including symptoms and behavior patterns. Hearing loss often causes people to respond out of context, and sometimes to withdraw socially. While those behaviors are often associated with dementia, they are not necessarily a signal that a person with hearing loss is in decline. Perhaps the true correlation comes from the reality that hearing loss that leads to isolation can lead to loneliness & ultimately to depression. Cognitive decline can occur in some instances, but data shows that occurs in less than 8% of the population with hearing loss, which isn't much different than in the general population.

Much of the research on this issue has focused more on hearing loss that goes untreated than on the entire population with this invisible disability. It's wise to get hearing help if you need it.

We had good attendance at this meeting, and everyone had interesting questions and positive comments afterwards. Again, thank you to MS Felten.

The original constitution of our organization says: "We are people who do not hear well, too often we are left out and misunderstood. It is time we learn more about what helps us & take steps to accept help and also to help ourselves."
